Common Outdoor Plants Toxic to Pets

Now that the warmer weather has arrived, you may be spending more time outside tending your garden. Be sure you tend to your pets that may come into contact with your plants as well. Curious dogs, *especially* puppies, will often nibble or devour plant leaves, stems, and even roots. Most plants will only cause a brief bout of upset stomach, while others are toxic and fast-acting.

There are far too many plants to show the entire list in the newsletter. And it doesn't mean you can't enjoy these plants in your garden. Just keep your pets away or plant in such a way that your pet cannot access the garden area. Here are just a few of the popular Midwest plants that are toxic to pets.

- Annuals: Coleus, Geranium, Begonias
- Shrubs: Hydrangea, Yews, Oleander
- Perennials: Iris, Lily of the Valley, Nightshade, Tulip and Daffodil bulbs, Bleeding Heart, Clematis

Vegetables: Onion, Mushrooms, Potato shoots

Don't get discouraged! There's an even bigger list of plants that are harmless to dogs. TheASPCA has an extensive list of toxic and non-toxic plants for dogs, cats, and even horses so you can be sure your furry friends are safe to roam and chew a little. RCBR needs help with several positions within our Rescue organization. These positions are vitally important in allowing RCBR to continue helping more Boxers in need. Positions and general descriptions are listed below. All positions will receive the necessary training and documentation. All positions allow for working with a mentor until comfortable with the duties. Most positions can be done virtually.

Foster Coordinator/Co-Coordinator: Works closely with Adoption Coordinator(s) and Transport Coordinator. Maintains foster home spreadsheet, orders supplies for foster homes, requests updates and photos of foster dogs, etc. Communicates with Rescue's approved foster homes to place incoming dogs. Time is critical for placement of incoming dogs and the Foster Coordinator must be available to respond in a timely manner (most often within one day) to all inquiries about open foster homes, foster home concerns and/or issues.

Fundraiser Coordinator: Should be comfortable contacting corporations for monetary donations or sponsorships. Participation in fundraising events is needed, based upon location. Works closely with the Social Media Director and Events Coordinator to ensure successful fundraising goals are set and met. Guides the Rescue with new ways to garner much needed funds and coordinates with individuals wishing to host fundraising events.

Event Coordinator: Involvement in all Rescue events, i.e., scheduling dates, securing event locations, working with Social Media to promote event. Works with the Volunteer Coordinator to ensure necessary manpower for the event. Manages monthly Adoption Meet & Greet Events by contacting and working with existing locations and securing new locations as needed. Maintains master event spreadsheet.

Adoption Co-Coordinator: Works with President and Vice President to learn all aspects of the adoption process. Includes connecting with approved adopters regarding available dogs as well as maintaining spreadsheet of potential adopters and their criteria for adoption. Works closely with Foster Coordinator connecting foster homes and families interested in an available dog. Notifies Transport Coordinator when transport to another area is needed. The Co-coordinator also works with Social Media Director to help promote available dogs. Our goal is to have the Adoption Co-Coordinator assume the Adoption Coordinator role upon completion of training.

Pressed for time but still want to help RCBR?

We are *always* looking for help with processing adoption applications, e.g., calling veterinary offices, contacting personal references, and performing virtual home visits or in-home visits when possible. These tasks should be performed within a three day timeframe and are conducted under the guidance of the Application Processing Committee Lead. All training and documents provided.

Volunteer Spotlight Jodi & Jim Wilder



My name is Jodi and I'm new to volunteering, but let me tell you how and why we got into this.

In 2003, my husband's (then fiancé) roommate had a Boxer boy named Odin. We instantly fell in love with the breed and loved their witty ways. When his roommate moved, naturally he took Odin. So we decided we were going to get a Boxer of our own.

How we got into Rescue: Back in April 2009, I saw an eight week old Boxer on Craigslist that needed to be rehomed. We immediately headed towards Rochester, Minnesota to get this little guy. We fell in love immediately and he became known as Thor. Our Thor was six months old when our local vet gave him a rabies shot with a dirty needle. He contracted streptococcus ... an instant death sentence.

In June 2009, a family friend saw a flyer for Boxer puppies and contacted my husband. I instantly said no, I couldn't do it again. But after several days of pushing, I gave in and we went to look at these four week old babies. We picked up Remington at seven weeks old. Then in 2012, a young stray Boxer mix was going to be put down. Naturally, I said no way that would happen. Off we went to save this one. She became known as Stella, as well as Jim's new truck companion until she decided to retire in 2016.

In late 2016, I came across an eight month old male brindle Boxer on Craigslist that needed a new home. This poor dog spent 20 hours a day in his kennel, had no shots, etc., and, I suspect, was abused. Enzo joined us and now, we were up to six dogs and a cat.

We decided no new additions to the family, but we wanted to get involved with Boxer rescue. What better way than to help with transport? Jim started doing transports in his semi about a year ago. He transports dogs from St. Louis to Minnesota. Transport helps RCBR, the dogs, and gives Jim company. A win-win-win!

I recently decided to help transport as well. I signed up for a transport and Dad, Mom, and I were off. A family affair! It was the best thing I've done, not only for Dad, but for my mom also. They ask weekly if we are taking a dog anywhere.
