

Approximately 10 years ago, I was bit by a pit bull and went through rabies shots. I have always been more of a cat person; however, this experience made me afraid of dogs. Determined to get over this fear, I began volunteering at a local rescue. After a few months with the rescue, I signed up to transport "a gray dog." I get to the meeting place and – you guessed it – it is a pit bull. As the other driver gets the dog out and walks her over to my car, I am panicked! The dog jumps on me and covers me in kisses. I was in love with this velveteen gray girl. She was the beginning of my love of transporting rescue dogs. I wish I would have kept count of how many animals I have transported. I live in Madison, Wisconsin, and have driven throughout Wisconsin, lowa, Illinois, Indiana, and Missouri to pick up rescue animals. Before the pandemic, I transported for several rescues, a few times a month. I am always on the lookout for a good book on Audible or Libby for my trips.

I still love kitties and fostered about 40 kittens total throughout quarantine. Unfortunately, I live in an apartment that does not allow dogs so I share my home with two cats, Zazoo and Zoey. I am a co-parent to a friend's Bernese Mountain Dog, Larry. Lots of cuddles and kisses. One of the biggest lessons I have learned through rescue is patience. The animal lets you know when they are ready. Every animal needs a different amount of time to jump out of the car or accept a good tummy rub. As humans, we just want to help them find a better life, but sometimes we need to slow down and listen to the animal.

You will see communication from me as RCBR's Volunteer Coordinator. I am currently working on gathering all contact information and areas of volunteering interest for each volunteer, so the Rescue has it all in one place. One of the best parts of volunteering is meeting the volunteers. It is amazing what good people are out there!

I'm Nancy and I started on this rescue journey back in 2019 when I lost my best friend, a rescued Boxer named Peanut. Rescuing Peanut made me aware of those "puppy mills".

After several weeks, she started gaining weight and I was excited and happy for her!

One night while lying in bed with her, I felt her stomach move. I did not think much of it and thought it was gas bubbles. Days went by and she was getting bigger and bigger, and her belly was still moving. I finally put two and two together and thought, "No way! She can't be pregnant." I knew nothing about dog pregnancies. I was *completely* clueless! I took her in for an x-ray and **SURPRISE** - Cupcake was pregnant and **due within the week!** Eeekkkkk!! I panicked like crazy because I knew *nothing* about a dog giving birth. I was scared but Cupcake was a rockstar and did amazing all on her own!

After helping out Cupcake with all of her medical needs, seeing her go through birthing, and caring for her, I just could not let her go. She needed to be with my family and me. She is finally in a loving and caring home and getting the best care ever! She will never have to worry about being out on the streets again or having any more puppies. She can finally be free and act like a dog.

We also rescued one of Cupcake's puppies, the only girl - Marley. After seeing how close and loving Cupcake was to her puppies (and of course falling in love with all the cuteness of them myself) I knew deep down that she needed one of the puppies to stay with her. Cupcake can now live a happy and loving life with one of her own.

My husband and I fell in love with our neighbor's Boxer puppy about 17 years ago. We then went to get a Boxer puppy (Bailey) from a breeder in Missouri. That was our first experience with a breeder. About a year later, we decided Bailey needed a buddy so we got a Boxer from another breeder in Arkansas. The puppy was flown in and we met her at the airport. Her name was Lily. At about the age of one, Lily started to have what seemed to be seizures. Later that year, they thought she had a spinal stroke. She ended up in the emergency room with the loss of use in two legs. We brought her to the University of Minnesota where she lost the use of a third leg. Lily eventually regained use of two of her back legs but was extremely weak. With much thought, we ended up helping her cross the Rainbow Bridge before her second birthday. I contacted the breeder who turned out to not even be a Boxer breeder and was just selling these puppies as a favor to someone!

The experience with Lily was so heartbreaking! We knew we needed another dog for Bailey and decided we wanted a local breeder so we could go visit and make sure it was legitimate. We found a breeder in northern Minnesota and ended up getting two Boxers over the years from them. They are just wonderful!

Our first dog Bailey developed degenerative myelopathy. She lived until just before her 11th birthday. I later learned the breeder we got her from was not very reputable. This experience is what led me to look into rescue. My two dogs at the time were not the best



socially, so I decided to start out helping with home visits and a bit with transport. It is amazing to see these wonderful dogs even though they have lived through so much.

Fast forward to today. We have a white male Boxer, Duke, who is 7 1/2 years old. Meg is an almost 6-year-old Boxer mix. My youngest daughter is 11 and has issues with sleep and being alone. We thought a dog might be something to help her through these issues. Now, Norman sleeps with her and is teaching her responsibility.

RCBR has been wonderful to work with. I love that they rescue the neediest dogs. Vanilla Cupcake needed some serious love, and they stepped up. When they found out she was pregnant, we were thrilled to be able to rescue and get a puppy. I will always rescue in the future. I hope as my kids get older we will be able to rescue the older, more needy dogs. I swear the dogs know how lucky they are! RCBR is a great organization, and I appreciate all the work they do. It can be a thankless job. I do not know if people quite understand all the work that goes into rescuing just one dog. Thank you RCBR for all you do!


