The World of Dog Auctions

RCBR was asked recently to absorb an overflow of Boxers picked up by another rescue through a dog auction.

What is a dog auction, you ask?

Most people have never heard of a dog auction, let alone attended one. People picture either buying a dog from a respected breeder or adopting one from a local humane society or animal rescue. Yet, there exists a market where large-scale brokers of dogs go to sell off the dogs they no longer have use for or think they will get better money for than at retail stores.

The millers and breeders looking to get rid of their stock will head to the site early in the morning with trucks that are filled with cages of their unwanted puppies and dogs. The practice began by these breeders looking to dump their worthless stock - older females who could no longer be used as breeding stock, puppies with deformities, or any other older dog. Auctions are a way commercial breeders refresh their stock as well as bring in new bloodlines.

These auctions are hard on the dogs. They travel long hours in small cages to be left at an auction warehouse. Conditions are often filthy, and the dogs are not cared for properly during their wait for the auction to begin.

Large amounts of money are spent on puppies, young breeding females, and highquality males. Sometimes the dogs are sold in lots and a new breeder will purchase the entire stock of dogs from another breeder. Oftentimes "deals" are made between commercial breeders before the auction begins on the available dogs.

Rescue groups have been involved in auctions for decades. Dog auctions were a place where these millers and breeders could go to sell off their unwanted stock of dogs and equipment to others in the field, and also to rescuers who would pay pennies for what the sellers had determined were worthless baggage or get the "leftovers" at no cost. Historically, the rescuers would often pay very low prices, as they were often considered to be taking the dogs off the millers' hands and all would continue on their way.

In the last decade or so, with the rise of animal welfare campaigns and social media, the model of these dog auctions has revamped itself. Today, it is not uncommon for the dog auctions to be filled with rescuers who are paying top dollar for purebred puppies. In fact, some rescue groups are spending as much money as breeders. It starts with the good intention of getting dogs out of the breeding cycle, but if prices are high, the rescue in turn is helping support the breeders and millers. It's a very fine line to walk.

Several Midwest rescues participate in the Missouri auctions hoping to get the older dogs left behind after bidding ends. RCBR has been contacted a few times and we have helped the other rescues that acquired more dogs than they had room for by taking the excess into our rescue for foster and adoption.

We do not support giving one dime to the breeders at the auctions.

Cara Adopted 1/29/23





It did not take long after Joel and I moved south in May 2022 for rescue friends to start tagging us in posts of Boxers in need of saving. Rocco was one of those Boxers. His owners surrendered him to the Hall County Shelter in Georgia at the age of 9 years old because they had a baby, and he was high heartworm positive. When we saw his face and those eyes, we just *knew* that we had to try and help him.

So, I called Lucy at Rejection Collection Boxer Rescue and said if they were willing to take him under the wing of RCBR, we would drive the 2.5 hours each way to pull him and we would foster him here in Georgia. After a few emails with the shelter, we got the OK from Lucy and we were off to pick him up, with Lilly in tow to make sure they got along. That was August 20, 2022.



They sent me back to get him out of the kennel and this guy was**outta** his mind excited! He could not wait to get outside. He ran around in the outdoor kennel and was *so* happy. It was then I learned that the dogs only get out to run two maybe three times a week! After the meeting with Lilly went well, there was no way we were going to leave without him, and he was **more** than happy to not go back into that kennel!



As soon as we got him home it was into the tub for a much-needed bath! When he got out, he was given his new name, Roscoe P. Coltrane.

We learned very early on that he likes to RUN!! You would never guess he is a 9+ year old dog with heartworm. To see him at full speed is a beautiful thing – but super scary when you don't have a fenced in yard!! We learned very quickly how we had to do things differently with him around here.

Thanks to RCBR Roscoe received heartworm treatment and after his follow-up appointment he will get his teeth cleaned. I think you cannot help but build a close bond with a dog when it is sick or does not feel well. It was during that time that Roscoe crawled up on the couch and on my lap so I would comfort him.


Outside snuggles

He picked up on her cues very quickly and listened well to us too. He sits for us to put on his harness before going outside and picks up on routines so quickly! Since Lilly has had a rough couple of weeks and was diagnosed with Vertigo, he seems to pay a lot of attention to her ears. He keeps licking them, especially her right ear. He just seems to know. Now that she needs help down the stairs, Roscoe has learned that he must wait until she is helped downstairs first and let outside before he can come down. He now waits at the top of the stairs or lays on the floor in the living room until he is called. We did not set out to train him to do this, he just started doing it. He is so smart!!

It does not seem that he received much socialization out of the house in his past life. He**LOVES** going for car rides and hanging his head out of the window. We are taking him to more places so he can learn the world is not a scary place when your people love you. When he gets scared, we leave so he knows he is not being forced into an uncomfortable environment. He is also getting better with people. He is not as afraid and we cue everyone to let him come to them, not them to him. He is approaching more people and is much less nervous and accepts attention from them. We are working on getting part of the yard fenced off for him to be able to run. We cannot wait to see him enjoy that.


Duke

TYPES OF BOXER DOGS

(AZ Animals, written by Heather Ross, updated 2/23/2023)

1. **GERMAN BOXER** — This type of Boxer was the first, oldest, and what some say is the only "official" Boxer dog. It is the largest and stockiest of the three breeds. Originally bred as a guard dog and bull-baiting dog in the 19th century, it later became butcher's helpers to control cattle in slaughterhouses. It is descended from the English Bulldog, Mastiff, the now-extinct Bullenbeisser or German bulldog, which was a hunting dog, and probably also Great Dane and a terrier. The length between its snout and skull has a ratio of 1:2, which is wider than the English Boxer. Fawn and Brindle are the breed standard's acceptable colors.

2. **AMERICAN BOXER** — The American Boxer was registered in 1904. When the American Boxer Club was formed in 1935, the original American Boxer had German basic stock with additional German and Austrian imports to create a unique breed standard. It is smaller and leaner than the German Boxer and has a snout-to-skull ratio of 1:3, with a snout that is larger than the German Boxer. Fawn, Brindle, and Reverse Brindle (Black) are the breed standard's acceptable colors.

3. **ENGLISH BOXER** — The English Boxer is the smallest of the Boxer breeds and is considered to be the most elegant. Its body is slender, graceful, and athletic, with thinner and shorter legs. It has a snout-to-skull ratio of 1:3 and its snout is thinner than that of the German Boxer.

4. **BRINDLE BOXER** — Brindle is considered to be one of two original standard colors besides the Fawn. It is a subtle color striping, typically of very dark brown or black on a red base, although purebred Boxers can't produce truly black fur. The brindle-colored dog may have a blue hue or be reddish-brown, similar to the Fawn shade. Brindle Boxers can be classified based on shade and the coat color. The stripes may also be dark or light. Tiger brindle, mahogany brindle, and reverse brindle – these are the three types. Some brindles even have white markings, which are deemed "flashy" brindles.

5. **FAWN BOXER** — Fawn is one of the other original standard colors besides Brindle. Fawn is a reddish-brown color. Some fawn-colored Boxers have white markings on their chest and paws so they are known as fawn and white Boxers or "flashy" fawns.

6. **BLACK or REVERSE BRINDLE BOXER** — This color of the Boxer is advertised as rare. Black is not one of the standard acceptable colors, but it does appear among all three breeds. It is the appearance of a black color, such as a very dark brown rather than being a true black for Boxers.

Also called reverse brindle, it is a heavy, dark brindle of very dark brown or fawn brindle on a very dark brown base. The coloring is lighter and more pronounced against the base as opposed to a traditional brindle.

7. WHITE BOXER — White is not one of the standard acceptable colors, but it does appear among all three breeds. Although some breeders think white Boxers have more health problems and are inferior to brindle and fawn Boxers, it is a purebred color and might one day be accepted in the AKC.


